CTD Zoom Gathering of CT Chairs



A survey was sent out some months ago to all those on CTD's contact list by the then Chair of CTD, Bishop Karen Gorham.

A number of people responded with the suggestion that Chairs of the different Churches Together and ecumenical groups across the county meet together to share stories. A physical gathering of Chairs of local CT and other ecumenical groups was organised to take place on 23rd September at the Allendale Centre, Wimborne. However, due to social distancing regulations, this was changed to a Zoom Meeting.

The meeting was very well-attended, with Chairs and other representatives of CT and ecumenical groups, a number of Church Leaders and members of the CTD Executive participating. Areas of the county represented stretched as far as Boscombe in the East, the Isle of Portland in the West and Gillingham in the North.

Covid-19 was the main concern. Services and events had been cancelled; new levels of poverty as well as rising isolation were reported. But stories included examples of the many ways in which the churches across the county have offered hope, assistance and relief to communities affected by the pandemic, very often by working together. Many services and meetings had moved to online, but there were also phone friendship groups and support lines for those without internet operating, and churches had engaged with Council-coordinated volunteer programmes to provide shopping and medicine collection; food banks were in full operation, with churches involvement, and more had opened – for example, two at Wyke Regis and Littlemoor, Weymouth. The churches in Swanage had linked in with the Christian charity, Besom, to provide support and needed items to families in need; in Bournemouth, in between the two lockdowns, work had taken place to help empower rough sleepers with back to work skills and confidence. The churches in BCP had engaged with Faithworks to support Recovery course online as well as its many other projects.

It was a valuable and highly informative meeting, and it is envisioned that these gatherings will take place a couple of times a year (online or in person).

Pray October: Churches from across Bournemouth and Poole prayed every day during October for God's hope to come to the towns. The prayer points across a range of subjects and a prayer for the towns can be found here



Bournemouth Churches Alongside Rough Sleepers (BCARS) are launching a Training Centre, helping ex-rough sleepers to access training, certificates and courses, including gardening and woodworking skills.

Faithworks Recovery has seen referrals triple since the start of the Covid-19 pandemic. The team have adapted the service to provide safe ways to access support, including online support and socially-distanced courses and walks.

Poole Community Exchange has just launched the exciting new project called the **Poole Pantry**. Other News

Footprints, the Church-related project supporting ex-offenders across Dorset and beyond, has been recognised for its work supporting women through its Out of Court Diversionary Scheme by the Howard League for Penal Reform, which gave the project a commendation in the Women's Category of its Community Awards. Working with Dorset Police, the new scheme, based upon a Canadian

Baptist scholar secures funding for Covid-19 research

Prof. Paul Weller, together with Dr Sanjee Perera, has secured special funding by the British Academy to conduct research on the organisational, financial and human impact of the Covid-19 pandemic on the Christian Faith-based Organisation Service Sector in Great Britain. The main research instrument of the project (which began in August and runs until April 2021) is an online survey of Christian FBO's, which will take place from October 2020 to January next year. Findings will be shared at a a Knowledge Exchange Conference in March, to which FBO's other than Christian will be invited to share from their perspective.

The Methodist Council have requested that their advisory body (the Joint Advisory Committee on Ethics and Investment) recommends disengagement and disinvestment by the Central Finances Board from all oil and gas companies not currently aligned with the Paris Agreement target of a global temperature rise of well below 2 degrees.

Tackling Racial Injustice

Churches Together in England has responded to the <u>Presidents' call for real change</u> to work towards racial justice. Trustees have set up a racial justice working group; CTE's <u>Enabling Group</u> will spend a key session reflecting on the issue and promoting change; and <u>County Ecumenical Officers</u> (CEO's) and those with with a brief for racial justice within Intermediate



Bodies have committed themselves to learning more about racial injustice and putting in place strategies to combat it. County Ecumenical Officers joined an online meeting in early October, organised by CTE, on Racial Injustice. The second part to this takes place in December.

'As One.'

Covid-19 has inspired a wave of community spirit, and many believe it is important to harness and build upon the amazing spirit of friendliness, service, love and supportive neighbourliness.

'As One' is a local/national post-Covid partnership initiative. Based on a highly successful Christian initiative in Birmingham, networks of churches at the city or county-wide level will be invited to approach their local authority with a partnership proposal which draws in other partners, including businesses, schools, community centres, GP surgeries, etc.

When gatherings are safe and welcome, churches in different areas will be encouraged to put on simultaneous outdoor Memorial Services for their local community, to help bring peace to the shared experiences of grief, anxiety, trauma, isolation and loss in the community. The same churches can then put on a 'Back Together' celebration in the form of a tea party, inviting nearby streets, in order for relationships to grow, belonging to blossom and isolation to recede. Church members living on those streets can help to build positive community, pray for their street and engage with the many, bringing something of the love of God to their community.

'As One' aims to provide a comprehensive service to take the burden off church leaders, including help with approaching the local authority, providing banners, branded letterhead for invitations, table signs, window stickers, clear written guides and mentoring support, suggestions for the Memorial Service and Back Together celebration format, while energising national media and social media profiles.
