Vaccines are one of humanity's greatest achievements. Take the HPV vaccine. It can prevent a woman from facing deadly cervical cancer. And while it was initially thought that a person would need at least three doses of the vaccine, <u>scientists have shown</u> that just a single jab provides powerful protection.

The life-saving potential is enormous, given that nearly 350,000 women die of cervical cancer each year—and 90% of them are in low- and middle-income countries. Although this safe and effective vaccine has been available for almost two decades, in 2022, just 21% of girls worldwide had received a dose.

Why do rates of uptake remain low? And what can be done about it? Anita Zaidi, president of the foundation's Gender Equity Division and a former pediatrician, shares her insights in a recent article: *Four things to know about the HPV vaccine*.

Today is the last day of World Immunization Week. In the past 50 years, vaccines have reduced infant deaths by 40% and saved 154 million lives. To maintain that momentum, governments and funders must continue to invest in vaccines, including funding Gavi, the Vaccine Alliance, this year.
