MEXICO

INTERNATIONAL PEACE DAY

conscious objectors of WW1. Their treatment was ridicule, hard labour, imprisonment in Dartmoor Prison and threatened death. None of them gave in. And In spite of this adhered to their belief and would not be prepared to take up arms to kill.

Members of our Justice and Peace group joined in a Peace vigil recently in the town centre organised by the Quakers to coincide with the annual British Arms Trade International Sale of weapons in London. Many thousands of people are employed in manufacturing these weapons designed for destruction and murder, a lucrative trade for the UK.

September 25th END OF OUR HOSEPIPE BAN

I got a letter in the post this morning from the SW Water Authority thanking us for our co-operation in the past months to save water as our reservoirs had been so depleted. Yet our authority is one of the worst in the country for polluting our rivers and coasts. River and coastal pollution is high on the parliamentary agenda at present, endangering wild life.
