DRONES SAVING TIME AND LIVES

In the Isle of Wight, the NHS is trialling the use of drones to deliver fragile medicine in a short time, which saves money and means patients do not have to go to the mainland for cancer treatment. Chemotherapy drugs have a short shelf life. Ferry and car takes 4 hours to get the medicines from Southampton to the IOW. Drones take only 30 minutes. So patients can have their treatment on the island rather than having to go to the mainland.

HUMAN RIGHTS DAY IS ON DECEMBER 10TH

Human Rights are not recognised in many countries, including our own with regard to the policies regarding those seeking refuge and asylum.

The United Nations declared the Universal Declaration of Human Rights in 1948, rights to be treated as a human being regardless of Race, Sex, Language, National or Social origin, Property, Birth or other status, Colour or Religion.

Over 850,000 persons do not claim their right to Universal Credit. Why should this be? when so many are impoverished, having to choose between eat or heat.

A TIMBER SCANDAL

Briton has failed to ban imports of wood produce in Belarus, despite evidence that the country's authoritarian regime is using forced prison labour to supply customers who include Western furniture companies. New figures show that the UK imported nearly £2 million in the two months after Putin's invasion of neighbouring Ukraine.

This in in spite of Belarus and its grim record of human rights, Whitehall officials have confirmed that wood products and timber can still be imported into Britain leaving it to companies to effectively impose their own bans in cutting trade ties with the country.
