This follows agreement between government and the business and labour sectors.

PAKISTAN: DEPORTATION OF AFGHANS

A petition has been brought to Pakistan's Supreme Court by rights activists seeking to halt deportation of Afghan refugees, as authorities are combing refugee settlements in an effort to find and send home thousands. More than 370,000 Afghans have fled Pakistan since October 1st. Pakistan vowed to expel a million undocumented refugees. Thousands of Afghans have gone underground fearing for their lives if they return to Taliban ruled Afghanistan.

It is reported that OPEC (the oil producing countries) may not attend the talks re the phasing out of fossil fuels.

FOOD COSTS

Research at 3 universities, Bournemouth, Exeter and Sheffield indicates that the average household now spends £605 more on food than two years ago. The report commissioned by the Energy and Climate Change Intelligence Unit found that since the start of 2022, £361 of the increased food cost is attributable to climate change and £244 to oil and gas costs.

RWANDA

The government's latest amendment of draconian immigration laws may still fail to be approved by the supreme court.
