GOOD NEWS

- We thank God for the life and work of **Prince Phillip**, for his loyal and loving support for the Queen and for the Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme which has been so beneficial and life enhancing for young people in many countries.
- Rewilding projects and technology are reducing death rates in natural disasters.
- In the strongest ever storm recorded in the Bay of Bengal, only 118 people died instead
