# • THE PLIGHT OF SEAFARERS

- 90% of the goods we import are brought to us by sea. Many seafarers are from India and the Philippines. During the pandemic they are a forgotten people, and their plight has not received public recognition.
- They have been unable to leave their ships, some on board in restricted surroundings for more than a year.
- Their families at home have missed their presence and support, and seafarers have been worried about their health and wellbeing in the pandemic.
- They have been unable to access their Covid jabs.
- Often the crew is small and speak different languages. Recreational facilities are minimal.
- Crews have not been able to visit the Seafarers Missions in ports and chaplains have not been able to go on board ships.
- Out of sight and out of mind.... It is not very often that we remember to pray for seafarers.
  So may we remember them this coming week especially.
