2 Indigenous Peoples

This month we restarted our monthly meetings, now on Zoom. IT has its advantages, for our numbers have increased.

Our focus was on Indigenous Peoples, followed by our usual time of reflection and Prayer for those Persecuted for their Faith.

INDIGENOUS PEOPLES

There are 370 million in 70 countries who maintain Social, Cultural, Economic and Political characteristics distinct from the society in which they live.

They are descendants of those who inhabited a country before foreigners. The new arrivals became dominant through conquest, occupation and settlement.

Often they are poor, vulnerable and live shorter lives

Many have their own intellectual and legal traditions, a way of life that that looks to living well with the Earth. For them water is a living entity.

With the intensification of colonialism there is an ecological crisis. Colonisers decided to eradicate indigenous economies, cultures and political organisations for the sake of establishing their own.

Indigenous peoples are disproportionally impacted by environmental degradation compared to other marginalised groups.

They have adapted and survived through their Resilience and Sustainability.

As nomads, pastoral and hunter-gatherers, their land has been impacted by logging, mining, oil drilling, pipelines, dam

construction and deforestation for farms, ranches and urban areas.

Avoiding deforestation requires legal frameworks which encompass partnerships with government, business, and community groups. A well developed corporate government is required with a lack of corruption.

Whole tribes of peoples have been eradicated by diseases brought by colonisers eg, Measles.

Health is general poor due to poverty, poor housing, lack of access to health care, cultural barriers, cultural difficulties and geographical remoteness.

Maternal and infant mortality is high, as is the incidence of TB, malnutrition, alcohol abuse and HIV/AIDS.

We discussed also disadvantaged indigenous peoples in our own county of Cornwall, where house prices are 18 times an average salary and second homes predominate, and where the china clay industry was taken over by "big business", and the lack of industry and coalmining in the north of England.
