Dear Friends,

The Church of England's National Investing Bodies could make an historic decision to divest from all fossil fuel companies at this July's General Synod, something we are keen to see and will discuss on an open Zoom call on 20 June – a call we invite you to join (register here).

In early May, the Church of England's Church Commissioners and Pensions Board announced that they would vote against the directors of fossil fuel companies in which they still owned shares; the Church Commissioners even mentioned the prospect of divestment in their press release, noting that in 2018, General Synod called on the National Investing Bodies to divest from fossil fuel companies not aligned with the Paris Agreement by 2023.

Though fossil fuel companies have had decades to invest in renewables and prepare for the transition to a net zero economy, they have instead continued to explore for new oil and gas against scientific warnings, all while spending an average of just 4% of their overall investment on clean energy according to the latest data from the International Energy Agency.

We are praying that this July, the Church of England's National Investing Bodies will decide that the best way to create change is to divest from all fossil fuel companies and invest in companies that are serious about climate solutions.

The Diocese of Sheffield makes fossil fuel divestment commitment

In late April, the Diocese of Sheffield announced that it had no investments in fossil fuels and would not reinvest in fossil fuels in the future. Sheffield made its commitment alongside its link diocese, the Diocese of Bondo in Kenya. Rt Revd Pete Wilcox, Bishop of Sheffield, said: 'As Christians we have a mission to speak out urgently for immediate action to prevent irreversible climate impacts and ensure a liveable planet for all of God's Creation.' Operation Noah will hold an open Zoom call on 20 June at 5.30pm for campaigners to hear about ways to support divestment in the Church of England in the run up to the CofE's 7-11 July Synod. The Church of England's National Investing Bodies – which include the Church Commissioners and

Pensions Board – have said they will divest from fossil fuel companies not aligned with the Paris Agreement by the end of 2023, though questions remain as to how the CofE will determine compliance as well as when divestment might be completed. Register.

Operation Noah praises CofE for voting against fossil fuel companies, urges divestment

Operation Noah has praised the Church of England's Pensions Board and Church Commissioners for voting against directors of fossil fuel companies in which the CofE still owns shares. In early May, the two National Investing Bodies made public their dissatisfaction with companies like Shell for underinvesting in renewables. In a statement from our Chair of Trustees, Revd Dr Darrell Hannah, we praised the Church of England's tougher stance with fossil fuel companies while encouraging the Church of England to divest from all fossil fuel companies – a move that will 'get the attention of investors around the world'. Church Times op-ed promotes divestment and a fossil fuel non-proliferation treaty

A *Church Times* op-ed written by Revd Dr Rachel Mash of Green Anglicans, Dr Cathy Rhodes of the Diocese of Sheffield and Revd Fletcher Harper of GreenFaith has made the case for Church divestment and a fossil fuel non-proliferation treaty in the wake of the G7 meeting in Hiroshima, Japan – a meeting in which leaders failed to commit to a phase out of fossil fuels.

Published on 26 May, the authors wrote, 'The faithful responses to disappointments such as the G7 meeting are renewed commitment and intensified public witness. More than ever, Christians across the UK are doing exactly that. More than half of the C of E's dioceses have committed themselves to disinvesting from fossil-fuel investments (learn more and involve your diocese by contacting Operation Noah). Last year, 500 UK church leaders, including 68 bishops, called for the Government to support no new fossil-fuel developments.' Read more.

Operation Noah's Bright Now Campaign Officer Bokani Tshidzu will speak at an online event in June exploring the relationship between investment and the environment. Researchers say there is now a 66% chance we will pass the 1.5C global warming threshold between now and 2027 due to emissions from human activities and a change in weather patterns expected this summer. If the world passes the limit, scientists stress the breach, while worrying, will likely only be temporary. But breaking the limit even for just one year is a sign that warming is accelerating and not slowing down. Read more.
